Sonata for Flute and Piano I. Allegretto ben Moderato II. Allegro III. Ben Moderato (Recitativo – Fantasia) IV. Allegretto poco mosso César Franck (1822–1890)

Written in 1886, the Franck Sonata was originally scored for Violin and Piano. It was a wedding gift to the violinist, Eugène Ysaÿe. This piece was later arranged for Flute and Piano in 1910 after Franck's death in 1890. The original publisher of the Sonata, the Parisian house Julien Hamelle, announced a first arrangement of the work for flute. However, the 1910 edition was never found, which left the flutists with the second edition that Jean - Pierre Rampal has arranged for his version of performing the Franck Sonata. The edition that will be performed today will be based off the Bärenreiter edition which is edited by Hamelle's in-house arranger, Franz Linden. This recital will also include a discussion of the performance approaches to the Sonata as well as a comparison between the violin and flute version with live demonstrations.
